Emory Law is a top-ranked US law school, offering a world-class faculty, a diverse student body, a sophisticated and dynamic urban setting, practical opportunities to apply legal theory and skills, and a global alumni network.

Emory's Master of Laws (LLM) is a 24-credit-hour program designed for individuals with a first degree in law who are seeking to build upon their legal background for professional and scholarly advancement.

Emory Law's academic rigor combined with practical learning opportunities affords both foreign- and US-trained lawyers an unparalleled LLM experience.



PROGRAM DETAILS

- Full-time, two semesters, with August and January enrollment. A part-time program is available for students who do not need a student visa.
- **»** Open to individuals with a foreign law degree or those who have earned a juris doctor in the US.
- **»** A diverse and collegial class experience, where LLM students enroll in courses with JD and other graduate students.
- **»** Experiential opportunities including intramural moot court competitions, volunteer clinics, and practical legal skills classes.
- **»** After successful completion of the LLM, foreign-trained lawyers may be eligible to sit for any US state bar open to foreign-trained lawyers with an LLM, including the New York and Georgia bars.

Emory Law also offers an abundance of academic and community resources, including an English Language Specialist. For international students coming to the US for the first time, a foundation program is held in July to help you adjust to the new environment and practice the English language skills needed for American law classes. Additionally, LLM students have full access to our Center for Professional Development and Career Strategy and the Emory Library system, which has more than 4.6 million print and electronic volumes.

Hugh F. MacMillan Law Library is a beautiful, usable space that spans five floors, and includes 132 study carrels, 450 seats, and spaces that work for every study style. The law library staff consists of 18 dedicated professionals, 9 of whom have advanced degrees in both law and library science. Our collection is a blend of print and digital materials. 
GLOBAL BUSINESS CITY

All applicants must apply through the Law School Admission Council (lsac.org) and submit the following:

- » LLM application
- » Personal statement
- » Resume
- » Undergraduate or graduate transcripts
- » Two letters of recommendation
- » Application fee
- » TOEFL or IELTS (for applicants whose native language is not English)

DEADLINES

- » Fall Semester: June 1
- » Spring Semester: November 1
